



# 14th GLOBAL MEETING WORKING GROUP ON PUBLIC-PRIVATE MIX (PPM) FOR TB CARE AND PREVENTION

JS Luwansa, Jakarta, Indonesia  
16 – 18 July 2019

## BACKGROUND

As countries move towards achieving universal health coverage, efforts to engage all care providers have gained more significance. Over a third of people estimated to have developed TB in 2017 were not detected and notified by national TB programmes (NTPs). This gap is more pronounced in countries with large private sectors, especially those with a high burden of TB. Seven countries with large private sectors account for 63% of the world's 3.6 million missing cases: in these countries, public-private mix (PPM) is the primary strategy for finding them.

Under the umbrella of the global Working Group on Public-Private Mix (PPM) for TB Care and Prevention of the Stop TB Partnership - that is hosted by the World Health Organization (WHO) Global TB Programme, countries have been provided support to enhance collaboration between NTPs and diverse public, voluntary, corporate and private health care providers for TB care in different settings. The PPM Working Group members include national TB programme managers, policy makers, representatives from the private sector, academia, field experts, international technical partners and development agencies. The WHO provides the Secretariat for the Working Group, organizes periodic global meetings of the group and leads the development and promotion of global policies, strategies and tools related to PPM expansion.

To advocate for greater engagement of the unengaged public and private health care providers in efforts to end TB, WHO, the Public-Private Mix Working Group of the Stop TB Partnership, and global partners released a new Roadmap in October 2018 at the 13<sup>th</sup> Meeting of the PPM Working Group, that identifies clear actions needed to expand the engagement of all care providers towards universal access to care. This builds on a Landscape Analysis of the private health sector on TB that was also simultaneously released.

The PPM Working Group Meeting being organized in Jakarta in July 2019, is the fourteenth to be organized since the setting up of the PPM Working Group in 2002. The meeting will focus on country progress towards adoption and roll out of the PPM Roadmap, to close gaps in care and reach all the missing people with TB especially in high burden countries. Global progress, challenges and opportunities to expanding PPM in light of high-level commitments to end TB and linked developments towards Universal Health Coverage and health financing will be discussed at the meeting. Strategies to harness digital technologies and also strengthen the engagement of civil society for better governance and accountability will also be deliberated upon.

## SPECIFIC OBJECTIVES

1. Review global progress and problems in prioritizing PPM to close gaps in care in high TB burden countries;
2. Discuss the progress in rolling out the PPM Roadmap and key steps to strengthen its implementation.
3. Examine, help improve, and explore resource mobilization for PPM

## EXPECTED OUTCOMES

1. A review of global and national progress on PPM expansion in the context of the 2022 and 2030 targets of the UN High Level Meeting on TB and the WHO End TB Strategy
2. Next steps outlined for strengthening the implementation of the PPM Roadmap, including support required.
