

## Annual meeting of the Child and Adolescent TB working group Tuesday 14 November 2023

## Purpose of the meeting

The annual meeting of the Child and Adolescent TB working group (hereafter referred to as the working group) will be organized on Tuesday 14 November 2023 in Paris, France.

The meeting will be open to all members of the working group representing a broad range of stakeholders including paediatricians, national TB programme (NTP) managers and NTP focal points for TB in children and adolescents, maternal and child health (MCH) representatives, technical and financial partners, community TB representatives, TB survivors and World Health Organization (WHO) staff from headquarters, regional and country offices.

The main purpose of the annual meeting is to share new developments and country experiences in scaling up the response to child and adolescent TB and to discuss next steps to move the agenda forward.

More specifically, the objectives are to:

- To launch the Roadmap towards ending TB in children and adolescents: 2023 update;
- To provide an update on the burden of TB in children and adolescents based on the Global Tuberculosis Report 2023;
- To provide an update on activities of the working group since the virtual annual meeting on 29 November 2022;
- To hand over the leadership of the working group to the new Chair and Vice-Chair;
- To share recent resources on TB in children and adolescents;
- To share early experiences with the uptake of policy recommendations and innovations;
- To discuss ongoing initiatives and research on TB during pregnancy and the post-partum period; the impact of TB on children, adolescents and families and needs for social protection measures; and ways to engage adolescents in care; and,
- To share selected recent papers on TB in children and adolescents.
